## **1. Hands-on Learning about LifeCourse Framework and Tools**

Using an interactive hands-on approach, attendees will learn about the LifeCourse framework and how each principle impacts conversations and planning with individuals with disabilities and their families. The second hour attendees will be introduced to and begin using LifeCourse tools for the person centered planning process and informing the individualized support plans.

## **2. MO DDD Tiered Supports Getting “IT” Done**

Without a carefully crafted succession plan, an organization's stability can be at risk when the organization replaces its chief executive or other senior staff member - especially if that leader has been with the organization for many years. This workshop profiles the Center for Human Services who decided that planning for future leadership was crucial. The organization created a program to groom future leaders and prepare the organization for change and growth.

## **5. Mental Health and People with Intellectual Disabilities**

This session will review the prevalence of mental illness in people with intellectual disabilities and reasons for referral to mental health services. Understanding psychiatric diagnoses, monitoring symptoms of mental illness and being able to communicate effectively with the treating psychiatrist will be discussion points to enable family members, consumers, and care givers to ensure that their psychiatric needs are met.

## **6. MO-WINGS – Missouri’s Guardianship Reform Effect**

This interactive session will inform participants of the proposed draft changes to Chapter 475, RSMo - MO's guardianship and conservatorship statute. This issue is one that impacts Missouri citizens with disabilities, families, providers, direct care staff and many others. Participants will also have an opportunity to provide input regarding the proposed changes and become involved in efforts to pass this legislation if they have interest.

## **7. WIOA**

President Barack Obama signed the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) into law on July 22, 2014. WIOA is designed to help job seekers access employment, education, training, and support services to succeed in the labor market and to match employers with the skilled workers they need to compete in the global economy. This presentation will engage attendees in sorting through what this law means for individuals with developmental disabilities and the future of job opportunities in Missouri.

## **8. Having Fun with HIPAA Training**

## **9. PEERS – Social Skills Training Program Outcomes**

This workshop will outline the goal, model and outcomes of Easter Seals Midwest's innovative PEERS social skills program. PEERS was originally developed at UCLA by Dr. Elizabeth Laugeson to support individuals with autism to make and keep friends. Easter Seals Midwest has utilized and adapted this evidence-based curriculum in order to reach families throughout the state of Missouri. The presentation will provide background on the model and its success.

## **10. Whose Life Is It, Anyway?**

In this session we will look at power and control in support relationships. Many people being supported feel that others are too often telling them what to do. Many supporters feel that guiding and deciding are expectations of their job or supervisor. We talk about choice all the time, but what does choice really mean? And does it differ from person to person? Come prepared to think hard and laugh as well!

## **11. 2014 Cutting Edge Award Winner – UPS Store, Ft. Leonard Wood**

In June 2013, the Center for Human Services was contacted by SourceAmerica with an opportunity to open a UPS Store Franchise at Fort Leonard Wood, MO, on the military

base. The franchise would provide the opportunity for integrated community employment for people with disabilities. This interactive, lecture/panel will share information on how decisions were made, communication with the board of directors, costs, and things to think about. One of the employees with disabilities who works at the UPS Store will share with the participants how this job has impacted his life.

**12. Wanted: A Home**

A multi-faceted discussion that shares our experience in opening up over 30 homes in a 4 year time span by leveraging community resources and private investors; accessible housing - tips, traps, and thoughts; and housing regulation within the CMS HCBS - opening our eyes as service providers & persons who receive those services.

**13. LifeCourse in Action Around Missouri**

This session will showcase how local county boards and support coordinators are applying the LifeCourse framework tools to their everyday practices and organizational change. Concrete examples and strategies for implementing practices for inclusion in educational settings, improving employment outcomes, organizational or staff capacity building and integrating long term services and supports will be provided.

Work group reports will include identifying and reporting, supports and services, prevention and awareness and investigations and prosecutions. Information on implementation strategies and next steps will be included.

**15. Next Steps in Self-Directed Supports: Support Brokerage**

Each month more individuals and families select the option of Self-Directed Supports; currently nearly 10% of those using waiver service elect this option. Support Brokerage will ensure that these individuals and families receive the support they need in order to be successful. In this session you will learn about the growth of agency based support brokerage and its importance in ensuring self-directed supports is a viable option for individuals and their families.

**16. Challenges of Loss and Grief Bring Opportunity**

Through the lifespan of one individual, storytelling, examples of successful grief interventions, end of life decisions and supports, participants will leave the session feeling competent and comfortable using the simple techniques of "being with" individuals who are grieving the loss of others and/or experiencing the end of their own mortality.

We will share the strategies, curriculum and knowledge gained in over 25 years through this highly valued program.

## **20. Supported Decision Making**

We will look at the global trends in Supported Decision Making. What it is and how it works. Ways we can put these principles in practice. There has historically been an assumption that if a person has a disability they need someone to make their decisions for them. With Supported Decision Making, people are supported to exercise their rights in making decisions for their own lives. Even if there are times when a person needs help making decisions, these decisions are based on the person's preferences and rights. The person is the driver of the decisions in consultation with others who are relevant in contributing to the decision being made.

## **21. Development of Quality, Affordable, Universally Designed Housing for Citizens with Disabilities**

A quality, affordable, universally designed home is the dream of many Americans. Individuals with disabilities, along with their families and advocates, have grappled with concerns about where they will live. This presentation will address these issues and provide solutions to the housing need for citizens with disabilities.

## **22. Promoting Independence and Building Pride Through Employment – An Overview of National Priorities and Federal Initiatives in Employment**

Since 2010, the national efforts and Federal priorities in affirming the employment rights of individuals with disabilities has grown tremendously through presidential executive orders to DOJ enforcement. In this session, participants will be provided an overview of these efforts and recent laws/regulations which promote Employment First.

### **23. Cybersecurity: You may be a target, but you don't have to be a victim.**

This session will take a look at computer security issues facing organizations today. Who initiates cyber-attacks against folks like us? Why? We will examine and dissect phishing emails and how to detect them. We will walk through some real life scenarios to demonstrate social engineering spear phishing attacks. Learn two things you must address for your cyber security plans to be effective.

### **24. CMS Home and Community Based Rule**

In March 2014, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released a final rule and guidance on the requirements of characteristics for home and community based services in which Medicaid-covered services are provided. Every state was required to develop and submit to CMS a plan no later than March 2015 of how they will implement this new rule by March 2019. Topics will include time frame for implementation, responsibilities of states, and implications for providers to be considered an HCBS setting.

### **25. Social Thinking for Individuals with Developmental Disabilities**

This workshop will address the basics of social thinking and how to apply these skills in working with individuals with development disabilities. This includes discussing the ability to consider your own and others thoughts, emotions, beliefs, intentions, and knowledge to help interpret and respond to the information in your mind.

### **26. Developmental Disability Health Initiative**

Participants will receive an overview of the Developmental Disability Health Initiative (DDHI) three and a half year project funded by the Health Care Foundation of Greater Kansas City. Participants will have the opportunity to consider changes that could be made within organizations to promote healthy lifestyles.

### **27. Home Automation: The Future of Independence**

The burgeoning field of smart home technologies is creating greater and greater opportunities for people with disabilities and seniors to live independently. With more and cheaper products becoming readily available all the time, individuals can customize and build systems to their specific independent living needs.
