

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### **ABOUT MACDDS**

The Missouri Association of County Developmental Disabilities Services (MACDDS) has been in existence since 1979. Of the 89 local SB40 county developmental disability resource boards in Missouri, including the City of St. Louis, 63 are MACDDS members, along with 23 Related Private Organizations and 2 Targeted Case Management entities. Collectively, county boards represent over \$122 million in locally generated tax revenues used to serve persons with developmental disabilities.

The goals of MACDDS are consistently person- and community-centered. MACDDS supports the concept of providing persons with developmental disabilities with individualized, quality services as close to home as possible. MACDDS recognizes and promotes the individuality and autonomy of local county boards in the structure and provision of services within their communities.

MACDDS holds monthly membership meetings, and members are also involved in committee work and special purpose groups to improve services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Additionally, MACDDS works with several Affiliated Public Agencies to improve the quality of life of those Missouri citizens with developmental disabilities and creates opportunities that will facilitate communication among major governmental/quasi-governmental agencies that are responsible for the development and implementation of public policy, which affects the lives of people with developmental disabilities and their families.



### **2024 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES**

For 45 years, MACDDS has partnered with the state to promote county initiatives in developmental disabilities services. Comprised of 63 county boards, our members lead local initiatives that have a statewide impact, improving the lives of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families.



### Increase Funding for Targeted Case Management to Reach Market Rate

When regular increases are not made, the system ends up in crisis.

- There has been no rate increase for Targeted Case Management (TCM) since 2015.
- Targeted Case Managers are the gatekeepers for \$11.6B in service authorizations for people with DD.
- Targeted Case Managers monitor the services received to ensure quality, quantity, and progress toward outcomes.
- Targeted Case Management providers are experiencing a staffing crisis, and many agencies will be paying the same amount for their degreed professionals as provider agencies are paying for direct care staff.



#### **Ensure Local Property Tax Levies Remain Intact**

Local county boards use their funds to provide local support.

- Personal property tax makes up approximately 20% of local tax levy funding, providing over \$20.5M annually to support people with disabilities.
- The workforce crisis and rising costs are challenging the service delivery system as stressed agencies compete for the same staff to provide critical support.
- If these dollars are reduced, the fiscal impact on the state WILL be significant, and people's health and safety WILL be in jeopardy!



# Ensure that People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) Receive Essential Services to Live and Work in their Communities by Appropriating Sufficient Funding

The DD system must be fully funded at market rates to ensure the health and safety of people with I/DD.

- Wages paid to employees across Missouri have exceeded wages paid to direct care employees that support people with I/DD. This fact causes direct care applicants to realize they can make higher wages in positions with less responsibilities.
- Over seven hundred people with I/DD are approved to receive services but are forced to wait because providers cannot expand under the current reimbursement rates appropriated within the state budget (Section 10.410). Families struggle while waiting for services and at times must quit their jobs.
- I/DD providers cannot offset increased costs of recruiting and retaining employees like private businesses by raising prices or fees charged to the customer.



#### **ADAIR COUNTY**

- Growth of Transition Coalition and startup of middle school After School Club and Summer Youth job exploration
- Strong Service Coordination services with successful advocacy for individuals in school settings, with Children's Division, for employment and with local health care providers
- Continued community education on inclusion with strong media support of programs such as the Spotlight Award, Community Engagement Conference, and other special events
- Outstanding participation in the annual legislative coffee chat

#### **ANDREW COUNTY**

- Just started our 25th year of transporting our clients! Transportation is vital in Andrew County as we do not have services within our county, so for clients to receive services, we must travel to other counties.
- Held our first Transition Fair for our high school students who will be transitioning after graduation to other opportunities. Our goal is to make this an annual event where agencies are able to meet and help answer questions for Andrew County families.

#### **AUDRAIN COUNTY**

- CARF Accredited
- Assisted in planning and funding for two inclusive public parks and public swimming pool
- Continued to provide funding for the Children's Therapy School and the Handi-Shop Sheltered Workshop

#### **BOONE COUNTY**

- Assumed TCM services for approximately 90 persons receiving residential services in Boone County
- Worked with an outside company to complete our first comprehensive salary and compensation study and were able to provide raises accordingly
- Partnered with Equipment Share (large company based in Columbia) to pilot a new internship; also provided People First language and disability awareness training
- Surpassed 2,000 individuals served
- Launched a new website with much improved accessibility features
- Hosted four state legislators at BCFR and toured one of our residential sites











#### **BUCHANAN COUNTY**

- Provided support to nearly 650 people through Targeted Case Management, Family Navigation, and HUD Housing
- Created and hosted three new 'Chatter Series', each being a 6-8 week session for people to connect and learn:
  - o Relationship Chatter about how to have safe and healthy relationships
  - o Healthy Chatter about healthy choices and the impact they can have on our health
  - Money Chatter about money management and financial safety
- Hosted a virtual watch party for Disability Rights Legislative Day
- Hosted a Tech-Fest where people could learn about assistive technology, view demonstrations, and access vendors
- Partnered with the organizations and area school districts of our Regional Transition Network (RTN) to host a Transition Skills Day Event for high school students to explore and learn about planning for life after high school
- Hosted Community Connections, a community conversation with stakeholders, local legislators, and influencers about policies and issues facing people with developmental disabilities and their families



#### CALLAWAY COUNTY

- Participants volunteered nearly 700 hours in our community in 2023
- Approved Wonderland Camp scholarships for 11 clients in Callaway County who would not have been able to attend
- Approved over 242 applications for services, supports and equipment for individuals who do not qualify for services or supports through federal or state funding

#### **CAMDEN COUNTY**

- Awarded the National Centers for Mobility Management Community Mobility Design Challenge Grant
- Launched new Mobility Coordination Initiative Project

#### CAPE GIRARDEAU COUNTY

- Board has been working hard to formalize grant request procedures, and we now offer two grant request cycles per fiscal year
- Members of our board have met with leadership from DD Advocates and PLB to learn how to improve our services
- Excited to have expanded our financial support to reach more agencies and therefore more individuals with developmental disabilities in Cape County

#### CARROLL COUNTY

- Opportunity Enterprises Inc. Sheltered Workshop reached a record-breaking year of diversion of cardboard, aluminum cans and paper from the landfills
- Received a \$20,000 grant from NMSWM to help purchase a new truck to better assist with recycling efforts

#### CHRISTIAN COUNTY

- Supporting over 615 individuals across Christian County
- Grown our case management program by 3 Service Coordinators this past year.
- CC Rhythm, our performing percussion group, performed multiple times across Southwest Missouri
- Partnered with Nixa and Ozark Parks Departments to open an All-Inclusive Playground in both cities
- Held our annual Transition Summit, Talent Show, Trunk or Treat and Dance
- Provided Life skills classes including Healthy Relationships, Driver's Education, Budgeting and Cooking















#### **COLE COUNTY**

- Expanded our Community Supports program to provide vital community-based services to individuals and families in need
- Celebrated the retirement of long-time Executive Director, Jim Casey

#### **COOPER COUNTY**

- Use tax levy funds to purchase services and equipment for individuals when insurance, income or other resources aren't available; in 2023, the board purchased:
  - o Physical therapy on horseback, Speech Therapy, Swim Therapy, and Music Therapy
  - o Summer camps for school aged children; attending a Music Therapy camp enabled a teen to learn lines, songs and perform in a stage production
  - o Assistive Technology such as a VR headset to help a child with autism sleep and adaptive trikes
  - o Modifications to a young adult's bathroom to enable him to keep living in the family home
  - o Repairs to the lift on an accessible van
  - Gas cards for an individual who needed to travel 60 miles round trip daily for medical treatment

#### DAVIESS COUNTY

- Friends of Families program; Medical Mileage program; Camp Attendees; Funded Therapeutic Horse Riding
- Funding YMCA/Community Fitness Center access



#### **DEKALB COUNTY**

- Transitioned 8 individuals from an ICF/ID group home to ISL settings

The Service Coordinators are essential internal partners and will advocate over and above expectations to ensure the highest quality of life, success, and independence for our consumers. When consumers do not qualify for a waiver, SB40 funds are utilized to meet the health and safety needs of consumers.
- Executive and Targeted Cased Management Leadership members are actively involved in local community awareness opportunities such as high school transition fairs, systems of care, and the crisis intervention team program as committee members, vendor participants, and/or presenters.



#### PULASKI COUNTY

- Expanded TCM office space to accommodate new team members, which reflects our commitment to growth and creating a comfortable and productive working environment for our Support Coordinators
- Results of our individuals/families surveys revealed an outstanding 97% satisfaction rate, which is a testament to our dedication to providing excellent service and meeting the needs of our individuals
- Our parent group non-profit, The Voice, provided grants to 6 people to attend summer camp, purchased crash pads, tablets, mattress, washer/ dryer, participated in many local events, and had a very successful fundraiser with the annual Winter Ball
- Sent all Support Coordinators to the MACDDS conference to enhance their training and knowledge in this ever-changing field



#### RANDOLPH COUNTY

- Awarded \$728,000 to community partner agencies for the purposes of supporting employment opportunities, transportation, inclusive community activities, and assistive technology
- Awarded an additional approximately \$100,000 throughout the year to meet specific individual needs in Randolph County specifically to those without Medicaid or other means of funding to meet those needs
- Randolph County case managers supported a total of 472 individuals in 2023 including 266 individuals in Randolph County and an additional 206 individuals across 4 other counties; due to the increase in intakes and transfers into Randolph County, an additional case manager position was added in 2023 to support this growth

- In 2023, the Center for Human Services' Garlich Activity Center and the Saline County Activity Center offered 65 off-hour evening and weekend activities at local festivals, car shows, sporting events, and other community interests fostering inclusion and life enrichment











#### ST. CHARLES COUNTY

- Celebrated the impactful and hugely successful career of the first and only Executive Director, Peg Capo, as she retired in June 2023
- Onboarded new Executive Director in July, 2024.
- 34 DDRB funded partner agencies with 75 quality programs provided by partner agencies
- 1,331 individuals received targeted case management
- 99% of customers reported positive interactions
- 2,471 individuals accessed DDRB funded services
- 506 individuals received support to participate in the community
- 542 individuals received employment supports

- Continued participation in a CDC grant opportunity through UMKC-IHD to address health disparities and barriers to health care in individuals with IDD










#### **WEBSTER COUNTY**



### 2023 AWARDS AND RECOGNITION

### **ROGER GARLICH AWARD**

Roger Garlich was a renowned pioneering professional whose career accomplishments were legendary. His calm, reassuring demeanor and optimism were inspirational. The Roger Garlich award recognizes a leader of state or national influence who, through their vision, mentoring, generosity and innovation, enabled people with disabilities to lead more fulfilling lives and empowered communities and families to better meet the challenges of disabilities.

### **PEG CAPO**

Peg Capo's skill, passion, professionalism, and spirit of collaboration make her more than deserving of the MACDDS Roger Garlich Award for 2023. Her influence and accomplishments far outreach the county she worked in, and it is impossible to capture all the significant ways in which her work had an impact. Peg was instrumental in the creation of the Partnership for Hope Waiver in Missouri, which helped support individuals and families with proactive and preventive services to hopefully avoid crises and the need for placement outside of the home. This innovative collaboration between the DMH Division of Developmental Disabilities, County Developmental Disability Boards, and Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services not only increased access to services. but also contributed millions to Missouri's gross state product and created hundreds of jobs for Missourians.

For many years, Peg served as a valuable member of the Advisory Committee of the UCEDD at UMKC. This work on the Advisory Committee provided guidance and support to UMKC's UCEDD projects in areas such as health promotion, education, employment, self-determination, and family support. Locally, and more recently, Peg collaborated with her local health department and local provider agencies to create a community disaster plan, including a closed point of distribution for people with disabilities and their support networks. This group was conceptually interested in preparing for extreme and widespread emergencies. In 2020, what was a concept became reality at the onset of the COVID-19 outbreak and pandemic. The work this group had already engaged in uniquely prepared their county to assist its people with disabilities and their support networks through this unprecedented emergency and in accessing much needed PPE and, eventually, vaccines.



For the past 30 years, Peg has devoted herself to creating and improving the systems that support people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. She has been a thought leader, trusted partner, and tireless cheerleader in a field that can leave you exasperated. When Peg spoke, people listened because she was thoughtful in her choice of words, led with compassion and grace, and focused on finding solutions. Her legacy is leaving MACDDS, DDRB, and all of Missouri far stronger than she found them, ensuring people with IDD are seen, heard, and fully included in the community.

### **JIM CASEY**

Jim Casey has demonstrated outstanding leadership qualities, a strong work ethic, and a passion for excellence. He has inspired others around him to strive for greatness and has made a significant impact in our field, making him very deserving of the Roger Garlich Award. His presence is guaranteed to bring smiles and a good laugh as he shares wisdom with humor and always make us feel appreciated and valued.

Neuro Diverse City is a safe recreational and social space in Zona Rosa (community center) that aims to offer fun and inclusion without the stress of trying to fit in. Neuro Diverse City welcomes everyone but is especially welcoming to those who are part of the neuro diverse and developmental disability communities. Neuro Diverse City exists to be a gathering place where inherent dignity is recognized and prioritized. It envisions a community in which each person is celebrated for being exactly who they are.



### **MACDDS SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARD**

#### KIM KOPFF

For over four decades, Kim Kopff dedicated her career to enriching the lives of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. She began in 1980 at the St. Louis Arc and worked diligently to elevate the Arc's leisure programs, growing them to support several hundred individuals annually. She nurtured these programs to ensure they demonstrated a commitment to meeting individuals' needs, were high-quality and fun! She worked tirelessly to be creative in her endless pursuit of excellence, always putting individuals first with the end result being individuals experiencing personal growth, developing new friendships, and a greater independence.



In 2008, Kim joined the team at Productive Living Board (PLB) as the Director of Agency and Community Relations. There she brought life to services funded by PLB, declaring there is always "fun" in funding, while always keeping the individual and their family first. Her innovation and talent for fostering collaborative partnerships resulted in alliances throughout St. Louis County and the region. Her ability to harness collective strengths led to significant achievements, exemplifying her dedication to those residing in the region, and living her motto of "leaving things better than you found them". Thank you to Kim Kopff for her exceptional career in service to others, coupled with her commitment to creating a support system for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families, which significantly improved the lives of people in St. Louis County and beyond.

### LIFETIME MEMBERSHIP AWARD

#### **LIFETIME MEMBER - PEG CAPO**

In 1993, Peg Capo became the first official employee of the DDRB of St Charles County, and she grew the organization to over 60 team members. She was pivotal in launching their Targeted Case Management program, which now serves over 1,300 people. Peg demonstrated her commitment to the work of MACDDS through her engagement on the Board, committees, and ad hoc groups, serving as MACDDS President in 2003, chairing the TCM Contract Committee and Governmental Affairs Committee, and serving on the Nominating Committee and Business Acumen Workgroup among others. ### MACDDS PRESIDENT'S AWARD: CHRISTOPHER WORTH



Chris has used his experience working with individuals with disabilities to create accessible communities, including the remodel of a McDonald's restaurant and the addition of sidewalks in Spanish Lake. He was employed at Paraguad as the Organizing Team Manager where he helped people form neighborhood groups, took on issues of healthcare and fair wages, taught an advocacy skill building program, and worked with individuals and provider agencies to learn how to organize and become involved in civic engagement, creating system change. Chris spends his life empowering people, with and without disabilities, and uses his voice to effect positive change. He has been very active in Disability Rights Legislative Day and has been a presenter and consultant for many organizations and programs. Chris teamed up with the



Coalition for Truth in Independence and Washington University Brown School of Social Work to do radical work around sex positivity, identity, and ending sexual abuse and neglect. He has taught Healthy Relationships/Healthy Sexuality for all. Chris has done powerful work to improve the lives of people with IDD and make Missouri a better place for all.

### FRIEND OF MACDDS: CHRISTOFF GIBSON

Several years ago, MACDDS was in discussion with the Family Support Division (FSD) about helping its member agencies address issues related to enrollment of eligible clients in Missouri public assistance programs. He has helped hundreds of people access Medicaid and has been a reliable point of contact over the years. He resolves issues quickly and is caring and supportive, a valuable resource for service coordinators and for clients. His prompt assistance ensures that individuals have access to necessary benefits for their health and well-being. He is always quick to respond in a professional, efficient, and kind manner. He can infuse humor into a stressful situation and often says "he's just doing his job"; however, his patience and attentiveness to situations far exceeds just a job. Christoff has been a vital resource for many MACDDS member organizations, and he has made an impact on the lives of people with developmental disabilities across the state, often without them even knowing who he is. He does all of this consistently and professionally with a caring and supportive approach. ### **SB40 ENABLING LEGISLATION**

Missouri Revised Statues, Chapter 205, County Health & Welfare Programs Section 205.968, Aug. 28, 1999

### Facilities authorized-persons to be served, limitations, definitions. 205.968.

- 1. As set forth in section 205,971, when a levy is approved by the voters, the governing body of any county or city not within a county of this state shall establish a board of directors. The boards of directors shall be a legal entity empowered to establish and/or operate a sheltered workshop as defined in section 178.900, RSMo, residence facilities, or related services, for the care or employment, or both, of handicapped persons. The facility may operate at one or more locations in the county or city not within a county. Once established, the board may, in its own name engage in and contract for any and all types of services. actions or endeavors, not contrary to the law, necessary to the successful and efficient prosecution and continuation of the business and purpose for which it is created, and may purchase, receive, lease or otherwise acquire, own, hold, improve, use, sell, convey, exchange, transfer, and otherwise dispose of real and personal property, or any interest therein, or other assets wherever situated and may incur liability and may borrow money at rates of interest up to the market rate published by the Missouri division of finance. The board shall be taken and considered as a "political subdivision" as the term is defined in section 70.600, RSMo, for the purposes of sections 70.600 to 70.755, RSMo.
- 2. Services may only be provided for those persons defined as handicapped persons in section 178.900, RSMo, and those persons defined as handicapped persons in this section wither or not employed at the facility or in the community, and for persons who are handicapped due to developmental disability. Persons having substantial functional limitations due to a mental illness as defined in section 630.005, RSMo, shall not be eligible for services under the provisions of sections 205.968 to 205.972 except that those persons may participate in services under the provisions of sections 205.968 to 205.972. All persons otherwise eligible for facilities or services under this section shall be eligible regardless of their age; except that, individuals employed in sheltered workshops must be at least sixteen years of age. The board may, in its discretion, impose limitations with respect to individuals to be served and services to be provided. Such limitations shall be reasonable in the light of available funds, needs of the persons and community to be served as assessed by the boards, and the appropriateness and efficiency of combining services to persons with various types of handicaps or disabilities.
- 3. For the purposes of sections 205.968 to 205.972, the term:
  - 1. "Developmental disability" shall mean either or both paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection:
    - (a). A disability which is attributable to mental retardation, cerebral palsy, autism, epilepsy, a learning disability

related to a brain dysfunction or a similar condition found by comprehensive evaluation to be closely related to such conditions, or to require habilitation similar to that required for mentally retarded persons; and

- a. Which originated before age eighteen; and
   b. Which can be expected to continue indefinitely:
- (b) A development disability as defined in section 630.005, RSMo;
- "Handicapped person" shall mean a person who is lower range educable or upper range trainable mentally retarded or a person who has a developmental disability

## Sheltered workshop program rules and regulations-board may provide residences or social centers. 205.969

- The board may provide a sheltered workshop program for the county or city not within a county and as part of the program shall conduct work and developmental programs as provided by section 178.910, RSMo, pursuant to rules and standards developed and adopted by the department of elementary and secondary education.
- 2. The board may provide places of residence and related activity or social centers for those eligible persons.

#### Board of directors, appointment, qualifications, terms, officers, powers and duties- vacancies and removal from office, procedure. 205.970

- 1. When approved by the voters pursuant to section 205.971, the governing body of the county or city not within a county shall appoint a board of directors consisting of a total of nine members, two of whom shall be related by blood or marriage within the third degree to a handicapped person as defined in section 205.968, and four of whom shall be public members. At least seven of the board members shall be residents of the county or city not within a county where the facility is located. After September 28,1979, all board members shall be appointed to serve for a term of three years, except that of the first board appointed after September 28, 1979, three members shall be appointed for one-year terms, three members for two-year terms and three members for the three-year terms. Board members may be reappointed. The directors shall not receive compensation for their services, but may be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses.
- 2. The administrative control and management of the facility shall rest solely with the board, and the board shall employ all necessary personnel, fix their compensation, and provide suitable quarters and equipment for the operation of the facility from funds made available for this purpose.
- 3. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, and irrespective of whether or not a county sheltered workshop

- or residence facility has been established, the board may contract to provide services relating in whole or in part to the services which the board may provide to handicapped persons as defined in this law and for such purpose may expend the tax funds or other funds.
- 4. The board shall elect a chairman, vice chairman, treasurer, and such other officers as it deems necessary for its membership. Before taking office, the treasurer shall furnish a surety bond, in a amount to be determined and in a form to be approved by the board, for the faithful performance of his duties and faithfully accounting of all moneys that may come into his hands. The treasurer shall enter into the surety bond with s surety company authorized to do business in Missouri, and the cost of such bond shall be paid by the board of directors.
- 5. The board shall set rules for admission to the facility, and shall do all other things necessary to carry out the purposes of sections 205.968 to 205.972.
- 6. The board may contract with any not for profit corporation including any corporation which is incorporated for the purpose of implementing the provisions of sections 178.900 to 178.970, RSMo, for any common services, or for the common use of any property of either group.
- 7. The board may accept any gift of property or money for the use and benefit of the facility, and the board is authorized to sell or exchange any such property which it believes would be to the benefit of the facility so long as the proceeds are used exclusively for facility purposes. The board shall have exclusive control of all gifts, property or money it may accept; of all interest or other proceeds which may accrue from the investment such gifts or money or from the sale of such property; of all tax revenues collected by the county on behalf of the facilities or services; and of all other funds granted, appropriated, or loaned to it by the federal government, the state, or its political subdivisions so long as these resources are used solely to benefit the facility or related services except those paid for transportation purposes under the provisions of section 94.645, RSMo.
- 8. Any board member may, following notice and an opportunity to be heard, be removed from office by a majority vote of the other members of the board for any of the following grounds:
  - 1. Failure to attend five consecutive meetings, without good cause;
  - 2. Conduct prejudicial to the good order and efficient operation of the facility or services; or
  - 3. Neglect of duty. The chairman of the board shall preside at such removal hearing, unless he or she is the person sought to be removed. In which case the hearing shall be presided over by another member elected by the majority vote of the other board members. All interested parties may present testimony and arguments at such hearing, and the witnesses shall be sworn by oath or affirmation before testifying. Any interested party may, at his or her own expense, record the proceedings.
- 9. Vacancies in the board occasioned by removals, resignations or otherwise shall be reported by the board occasioned by removals, resignations or otherwise shall be reported by the board chairman to the mayor's office and shall be filled in like manner as original appointments; except that, if the vacancy occurs during an unexpired term, the appointment shall be for only the unexpired portion of that term.

- 10. Individual board members shall not be eligible for employment by the board within twelve months of termination of service as a member of the board.
- 11. No person shall be employed by the board who is related with the third degree by blood or by marriage to any member of the board.

#### Tax levy, approval, use. 205.971.

The board of aldermen or other governing body of a city not within a county and the county commission or other governing body of the county, except for a county of the first classification having a charter form of government containing in part a city with a population of more than three hundred fifty thousand inhabitants, or a county of the first classification having a charter form of government with a population of at least nine hundred thousand inhabitants may, upon approval of a majority of the qualified voters of such city or county thereon, levy and collect a tax not to exceed four mills per dollar of assessed valuation upon all taxable property within the city or county for the purpose of establishing and maintaining the county sheltered workshop, residence, facility and/or related services. The county commission nor other governing body of a county of the first classification having a charter form of government with a population of at least nine hundred thousand inhabitants may, upon approval of a majority of the qualified voters of such county or city voting thereon, levy and collect a tax not to exceed two mills per dollar of assessed valuation upon all taxable property within such county or city for the purpose of establishing and maintaining the county or city sheltered workshop, residence, facility and/or related services. The tax so levied shall be collected along with other county taxes, or in the case of a city not within a county, with other city taxes, in the manner provided by law. All funds collected for this purpose shall be deposited in a special fund and shall be used for no other purpose. Deposits in the fund shall be expended only upon approval of the board.

#### Maximum tax-ballot form. 205.972.

- 1. The tax may not be levied to exceed forty cents per each one hundred dollars assessed valuation therefor except for a county of the first classification having a charter form of government containing in whole or part a city with a population of more than three hundred fifty thousand inhabitants, or a county of the first classification having a charter from of government with a population of at least nine hundred thousand inhabitants voting thereon shall not levy a tax to exceed twenty cents per each one hundred dollars assessed valuation therefor.
